African-American History Month

The following story written by Senior Staff Writer Ida Brown was published in the Feb. 16, 1992, edition of *The Meridian Star*. Polly Glover Heidelberg, also known as 'Miss Polly," was a local civil rights activist who befriended the three murdered civil rights workers James Earl Chaney, Andrew Goodman and Michael "Mickey" Schwerner.

'I'm going to keep on fighting for my people. I was in 'slavery' time. I don't have no need to let you stay there because I was there," said Polly Heidelberg, the woman who many affectionately call "Miss Polly" or "Mother".

n the early '60s, Mrs. Heidelberg joined the Council of Federated Organizations COFO). Based in Atlanta, the organization was geared to registering blacks to vote.



According to the Rev. Charles Johnson, now pastor of the Church of the Nazarene who also was a COFO member, Anlrew Young (former mayor of Atlanta and a right-hand man of King) and John Lewis (a Georgia congressman who was active in Mississippi's civil rights movement) came to Meridian when an office was established here. Mrs. Heidelberg ater became involved in the civil rights movement through Mickey Schwerner, James Chaney and Andrew Goodman – he three civil rights workers slain in Philadelphia in 1964.

Mrs. Heidelberg's roots in the local civil rights movement are firmly planted. She is recognized not only locally, but also tate-to-state and nationally. "I like to refer to her as a 'trailblazer," Clark said. "She went through the jungles of racial rejudice and was involved in the knocking down of barriers so that others could come through with less pain and effort ... Miss Heidelberg should have the same national recognition as Fannie Lou Hamer because she's of the same mold. But where Fannie Lou Hamer followed through on things she saw as wrong, Mrs. Heidelberg would put together a situation and turn it over to the local leaders. They, more or less, received and claimed more recognition than Miss Polly did. But she was one of the ones that got things started." She also is considered an invaluable resource. "I don't think you could put a value on the contributions Mrs. Heidelberg has made," said state Rep. Charles Young. "She played a very nstrumental role in creating change. God has many different kinds of messengers who come in many different forms and fashions. Mrs. Heidelberg has delivered a very unique message.

"During the movement, your most highly educated people weren't the persons that created change. They were basially symbols of the status quo because they were afraid they would lose what they had ... When others thought they had oo much to lose, she would step in and do whatever needed to be done."

MHA would like to celebrate Meridian's civil rights hero Ms. Polly Glover Heidelberg "Miss Polly".

Notable African-Americans Contributions to Meridian Housing Authority




There are three prominent MHA properties J.T. Davis, George Reece Court and Frank Berry Courts. How many of you know that these properties were named after prominent African-Americans of Meridian? Reverend J.T. Davis was pastor of Mt. Olive Missionary Baptist church according to an article in *The Meridian Star*: Mount Olive Missionary Baptist Church was organized in 1923 the original structure of the church, worship service was held in the Brush Harbour. During L.S. Lee's administration, the first piano was purchased. Other projects and goals were

ttained during Rev. A.R. Clayton (1931-1935), Rev. J.T. Davis and Rev. John Robertson's administrations. This article loes not go into detail as to the many contributions Reverend J.T. Davis gave to Mt. Olive and to the City of Meridian out he will always be remembered with the naming of J.T. Davis Courts in his honor.
